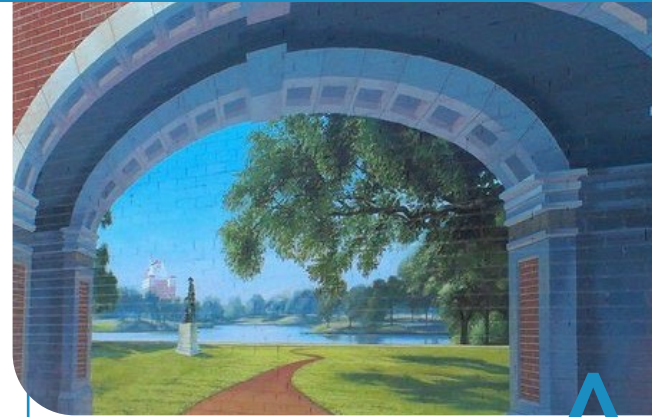
Kimbell Art Museum presents Queen Nefertari's Egypt

The special exhibition "Queen Nefertari's Egypt" celebrates the wives of pharaohs of the New Kingdom Period (1550-1070 BC), when Egyptian civilization was at its height. Nefertari, whose name means "the most beautiful of them all," was the beloved royal wife of Pharaoh Ramesses II.

Linked to some of the most magnificent monuments of ancient Egypt, she not only appears in statues, images and inscriptions on the buildings of Ramesses II, but a complete temple was consecrated to her in Abu Simbel, beside the one dedicated to her husband. Her tomb is the largest and most richly decorated in the Valley of the Queens.

Nefertari, as well as other royal wives, sisters, daughters and mothers of pharaohs, and even women who were pharaohs themselves, are brought to life through approximately 230 exceptional objects, including statues, jewelry, vases, papyrus, steles, mummies, wooden coffins, and stone sarcophagi, as well as various items of daily life. These astonishing treasures showcase the legacy of these amazing women, whose status often verged on divine. All of the selected masterpieces are from the Museo Egizio in Turin.

Dinosaur Drive-Thru

For the first time, Dinosaur Drive-Thru will be offered in Arlington in the parking lot of Six Flags Hurricane Harbor through January 10, 2021.



Dinosaur Drive-Thru is a fantastic option for a family-friendly, COVID-safe, activity. The attraction presents over 60, museum-quality and animatronic, dinosaurs that will entertain, engage, educate and amaze kids of all ages.

Visitors remain in their vehicles throughout the entire 45-minute show. Each dinosaur is displayed in chronological order with a very fun and interactive audio tour guide describing all of the interesting facts, and some jokes, about each dinosaur, in both English and Spanish. There is also a free trivia game, with a scorecard, that is played in each vehicle to keep visitors engaged with the tour. The person in the group with the most correct answers, at the end of the show, wins a free official Dino Guru certificate! Tickets are \$55 per vehicle, not per person, which includes up to 8 people.

"We are all dads of little kids, and during most of 2020, there's not much for families to do. We really wanted our visitors to safely experience the excitement of what it would be like to go on a prehistoric safari. Instead of lions and tigers, we're featuring T-Rexes and Raptors!" said owner Troy Diskin. Holocaust Museum Special Exhibits

THE FIGHT FOR CIVIL RIGHTS IN THE SOUTH FEBRUARY 19, 2020 - MAY 31, 2021

The Fight for Civil Rights in the South combines two prestigious photography exhibitions covering the African American struggle for civil rights and social equality in the 1960s – *Selma to Montgomery: Photographs by Spider Martin* and *Courage Under Fire: The 1961 Burning of the Freedom Riders Bus*.

In *Selma to Montgomery*, photographer James "Spider" Martin captures the iconic march to Montgomery, Alabama in 1965, including the moment when Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. led more than 2,000 marchers across the Edmund Pettus Bridge. Martin's photos brought attention to the Civil Rights Movement and documented this nonviolent action that helped lead to the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Courage Under Fire depicts a peaceful protest met with violence in Anniston, Alabama in 1961. Travelers known as Freedom Riders rode buses into the South to protest segregation on public transportation. On Sunday, May 14, 1961, riders nearly died when their bus was set on fire by members of the Ku Klux Klan. Photographer Joseph Postiglione brought national attention to the violent resistance to desegregation.

The Fight for Civil Rights in the South combines *Selma to Montgomery: Photographs by Spider Martin* and *Courage Under Fire*. They are curated and circulated by the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute (BCRI), with contributions from the City of Birmingham and to BCRI's Corporate Campaign.

Explore These 5 Trails in Addison

The temperature is just right to grab your running shoes and a light jacket and head outdoors to explore the many trails in Addison. Below are five local favorites to get you offline and outside.

White Rock Creek Trail

Enjoy a nature walk on this trail that meanders alongside White Rock Creek's west bank, with numerous overlooks and views. It is one of the longest and most heavily used trails in North Texas and it is achievable for any skill level. It is very popular with bike riders and is perfect for a Sunday stroll. While you are out see if you can find the wood carved sculptures along the trail. Feel free to bring your four-legged family member but be sure to keep them on a leash.



Vitruvian Park

Nestled in Vitruvian Park is a walkway that connects to other greenbelt trails within Addison and adjacent regional trail systems. The trail is primarily used for walking, running, and nature trips. Those looking for a challenge, take the almost 2-mile loop that runs from Vitruvian Park to Brookhaven College.

Arapaho Trail

Arapaho Park is an outdoor favorite at the southwest corner of Arapaho Road and Addison Road. It has become a premier spot for residents and visitors to see the annual airshow and fireworks during Kaboom Town!. Another feature of the park is the Arapaho Trail, which usually hosts various 5Ks in Addison, such as Wipe Out Kids' Cancer Oktoberfest 5K or the Hot Cake Hustle. Tackle it yourself as you train for the big races next year.

Les Lacs Linear Park

The possibilities are endless in Les Lacs Linear Park. Find a trail that is just your speed in more than 11 acres of greenbelt that spans the north side of Beltway Drive between Marsh Lane and Midway Road. The main multi-use trail is almost a mile long with a view of the scenic lake. Other features of the park include two playgrounds, volleyball courts, tennis courts, and an outdoor basketball court.

North Addison Park

This hidden Addison gem is a real find for walkers and joggers. The 3.45-acre park features a half-mile, one-way jogging trail that offers a quick way to exercise during a busy week. As you get your heart rate up, take in the artistic arbor or see the beautiful flowers in the pollinator patch.

Klyde Warren Park

Need a new workout routine? Break a sweat and get the heart pumping at the park, for FREE. They have boot camps, yoga, tai chi, Zumba, and even ballroom dancing. Research suggests that shared public space encourages healthy lifestyles. Whether you add a stroll around the park to your lunch hour routine or take advantage of the many free classes each week, the park is a great health benefit we can all enjoy.



White Rock Lake

For the athletic types, White Rock's nine-mile hike and bike trail is perfect for a family day outdoors and offers plenty of space to spread out. Take in the stunning lakefront views with a to-go pizza from nearby Cane Rosso or juicy barbecue from Smoky Rose. Or do some bird-watching with loved ones at sunset. Snap plenty of pictures, too!

The Dealey Plaza National Historic Landmark District Interactive Guide

The **Sixth Floor Museum** in Dallas has introduced a new free digital online experience that allows people to explore the history of Dealey Plaza and the events that happened there on November 22, 1963 without ever leaving home.

The Dealey Plaza National Historic Landmark District interactive guide offers a variety of multimedia features, most notably *Friday, November 22, 1963*, a narrated walking tour that lets visitors navigate the site of the Kennedy assassination. The tour goes through the final moments of the presidential motorcade as it entered and proceeded through Dealey Plaza. It features films, photographs, contemporary news broadcasts, and an oral history, highlighting seven stops in the plaza. The three other components of the guide include:

- *Explore the Plaza*, an interactive map that offers a self-guided, self-paced exploration of 17 different points of historic interest in and near the plaza.
- *The Front Door of Dallas*, a visual story tracing the history of the Dealey Plaza site from the founding of Dallas to the present day.
- *Facing Tragedy*, a visual story that chronicles the ways Dallas has honored President Kennedy and memorialized the assassination and other tragic moments in the city's history.
- The guide takes around 30-40 minutes to complete, depending on how much time a user spends in any particular section.

"The museum is pleased to bring this project to life for the Dallas community," said Nicola Longford, CEO of The Sixth Floor Museum, in a statement. "Whether you have a little bit of time or a lot of time and whether you are in Dealey Plaza in person or taking advantage of this from afar, the guide will enlighten and educate you and your family about the fascinating history of Dealey Plaza and Dallas."

During the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown, museum staff began transitioning some of their core storytelling traditionally experienced inside the museum to a virtual platform. The development of a user-friendly digital guide to the historic sites surrounding the museum was part of a goal of making historical content more accessible to broader audiences. The digital experience marks the first time that a comprehensive view of the long history of Dealey Plaza — the site where Dallas was founded — is explored in an interactive and digital format and is accessible to anyone in the world at no cost. The information presented in the guide goes as far back in time as 1841 and the founding of Dallas by John Neely Bryan and covers events in the plaza through the protests for social and racial justice in summer 2020.

The guide, which can be easily viewed on different devices, including computers, tablets, and smartphones, is available at dealeyplaza.jfk.org in both English and Spanish.
